Weber County is holding a "Vote by Mail" election on June 25, 2013. Why is Weber County conducting an election by mail?

Voter turnout is typically very low in an off-year election. Conducting an election by mail ensures that everyone is aware of the election and has an opportunity to participate. Weber County wants as many citizens as possible to vote, and a by-mail election is one way to increase voter turnout. States that have conducted their elections entirely by mail have typically seen a noticeable increase in voter turnout. Because of this, the Utah legislature established a commission to study the benefits of voting by mail.

Beginning May 28th, official ballots will be mailed to all active registered voters. Ballots will be mailed out on a weekly basis to those who register after May 28th.

How do I return my ballot?

Your ballot will include a postage paid return envelope. All ballots returned through the mail must be postmarked no later than June 24, 2013 (the day before Election Day). Ballots can also be dropped off at any of the secure official ballot drop box locations beginning May 28th through Election Day, June 25th. These same locations will also serve as Vote Centers on Election Day and will allow those who did not receive a ballot or who wish to vote on a machine the opportunity to vote in the traditional manner.

Did you know?

6,000 Weber County voters voted by mail in November 2012. Duchesne County's November 2012 election was entirely by mail. Their voter turnout was 92% compared to the state average of 70%. Riverdale and Syracuse City will be conducting their municipal elections all by mail. Cache County is also holding a special election all by mail this year. Oregon and Washington conduct all their elections by mail. They're both in the top five states in the nation for voter turnout. Voting by mail gives you the opportunity to study the ballot in your own home, on your own schedule, and even in your pajamas! Some people have held "by-mail ballot parties," where they bring their ballots, eat, discuss the issues, and then go home to vote privately. WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

Water conservation measures are an important first step in protecting our water supply. Such measures not only save the supply of our source water, but can also save you money by reducing your water bill. Here are a few suggestions:

You can conserve outdoors as well:

- Water the lawn and garden in the early morning or evening.
- Use mulch around plants and shrubs.
- Repair leaks in faucets and hoses.
- Use water-saving nozzles.
- Use water from a bucket to wash your car, and save the hose for rinsing.

Conservation measures you can use inside your home include:

- Fix leaking faucets, pipes, toilets, etc.
- Replace old fixtures; install water-saving devices in faucets, toilets, and appliances.
- Wash only full loads of laundry.
- Do not use the toilet for trash disposal.
- Take shorter showers.
- Do not let the water run while shaving or brushing teeth.
- Soak dishes before washing.
- Run the dishwasher only when full.



WHEN TO WATER: It may surprise you to learn that lawn watering uses nearly half of the water around homes. That's because everyone wants a great-looking yard. And why not? Attractive lawns and landscapes not only improve your home's property value, but they also provide a constant source of pleasure and pride. Here's the good news: maintaining a great looking lawn doesn't have to conflict with water-wise conservation and irrigation practices. In fact, with a bit of planning, the two go hand in hand. Turf studies have shown that most lawns only need to be watered once every 3 to 4 days to stay healthy and green. Watering everyday creates shallow roots. Watering infrequently develops deep roots and healthier turf. Grass roots grow deeper into the soil and become stronger with less watering. If grass does not spring back after being stepped on, it's time to water. Water only when needed.

More Tips for a Healthy Lawn

How much is enough?

Before you can create an efficient watering schedule, you need to determine how much water your lawn is getting from your present method. This test will give you that information; it's based on measurements taken from different zones in your yard. A zone is a specific area of your landscape served by a series of sprinkler heads. Just follow these simple steps:

1. Set 3 or more flat bottom cans or coffee mugs at various places on your lawn at least 4 feet from the sprinkler heads.
2. Turn on the sprinkler(s) for 15 minutes.
3. Measure the depth of water in each can with a ruler and determine the average water depth in cans by adding up all the measurements and dividing by the number of cans used.
4. Match your sprinkler output with the table below. Then water as indicated.

Water Depth in Cans	1/8	3/16"	1/4"	5/16"	3/8"	1/2"	5/8"	3/4"	1"

North Ogden City generally sees an increase in property crimes during the Spring and Summer months. This is the time of year when residents tend to leave their home and vehicle doors unlocked and windows open. Bicycles, lawn mowers, and other property also get left outside, unattended more often during these warmer months. Remember, it only takes seconds to become a crime victim. Please take extra precautions to make certain your home, vehicles, and other property are secure. There was a recent story on the news from the Salt Lake Valley, where individuals have been burglarizing homes, garages and vehicles. Suspects were caught on surveillance video snooping around people's houses, looking for unlocked doors and windows. These criminals are also suspected of entering homes through dog-doors. Closer to home, we have experienced numerous vehicle burglaries in recent months where suspects would stroll through a neighborhood checking for unlocked vehicles. When they found a vehicle they could enter, they would rummage for anything they could steal. Again, these criminals only need a matter of seconds to steal what they want. One common feeling the victims express is that afterwards, they feel violated and do not feel comfortable in their own surroundings, knowing that an intruder had been in there, rummaging through their dressers, closets, and other personal belongings. Please, do what you can to prevent becoming the next victim. We encourage residents to walk around your property as though you were a criminal. Look for ways someone can enter your property, and identify items that are left out that could be stolen. If you take the time to address these issues, it could save you a lot of heartache and stress in the future. On a related note, the North Ogden Police Department is available to meet with neighborhood and community groups to discuss crime in our community and steps residents can take to reduce the likelihood that they will become a victim. IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE WEBER-MORGAN HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Rabies: Touching Wild Animals Could Mean Trouble

It's not uncommon to find bats throughout Weber and Morgan Counties. Most of the time, bats keep to themselves – only coming out at night. That's why the Weber-Morgan Health Department reminds you that seeing a bat during the day is a sure sign something is wrong. If you, a family member or your family pet come in contact with a bat or find one – dead or alive – please contact your local animal control agency or the Northern Utah Division of Wildlife Services to retrieve it.

The rabies virus is fatal if left untreated. Seek immediate medical attention from a physician if you are scratched or bitten by a bat or any other suspect animal. Please ask your physician to make sure the incident gets reported to your local health department. The WMHD reporting line is 801-399-7232. Other animals known to carry rabies include squirrels, foxes, raccoons, and skunks. Cats and dogs can also become infected if they have contact with an infected bat or another sick animal. Stay away from animals – domestic or wild – that are acting aggressively, having trouble walking and/or swallowing. Do not touch them or bring them into your home to nurse them to health. It is best to call on of the agencies listed above. The best way to protect your pets and your family is to keep your pets vaccinated. If your animal happens to be involved in a biting incident, the quickest way to clear up many concerns is to produce your pet's vaccination records. Ask your veterinarian today if your pet's immunizations are up to date.
