NORTH VIEW FIRE DEPARTMENT

Due to the extremely mild winter that we have had and the continual hot, dry weather; collectively, Weber County Fire Marshals have placed a restriction on fireworks. The restriction was posted in the Standard Examiner, but for those who may have missed the article, it is as follows: The restriction is in effect immediately and runs through October unless further notified. No fireworks will be allowed anywhere East of Mountain Road to approximately 3300 N., then North of 3300 N. to the Ogden Brigham Canal, extending north of the Ogden Brigham Canal to the Box Elder County line. **Fireworks will be confiscated and citations will be issued upon violation.** We want everybody to enjoy this fireworks season safely. Below are some fireworks safety rules. We hope you all have a safe and fun time celebrating our Nation's freedom.

- 1) Make sure an adult is present and supervising.
- 2) Make sure that you are in a clear space with no overhead obstructions and no dry grass or bushes nearby.
- 3) Make sure to follow the instructions that come on the fireworks.
- 4) Make sure you place fireworks on a flat surface.
- 5) Make sure to have a water hose nearby and remember to discard spent fireworks in a bucket of water and not in the garbage can.
- 6) Use common sense; if you have to stop and think twice about doing something, you probably shouldn't be doing it.

Utah and surrounding states have started to see the effects of this year's unusually dry season. There have already been several large fires in the intermountain region that have threatened or destroyed lives and communities. There have also been several smaller fires locally. So far, no lives have been lost in our area as the result of these fires, and damage has been isolated to remote areas, but that could change at any time. Fire officials anticipate that the worst is yet to come this season. In an attempt to avoid becoming the next headline news report, cities throughout the county have placed fire restrictions in especially threatened areas. In North Ogden, these fire restrictions encompass anything east of Mountain Road north to 3300 North, and anything north of 3300 North until it reaches the Pineview irrigation canal. The restrictions continue for anything north of the canal until it reaches the Pleasant View City border. These restrictions prohibit the use of **all** fireworks and **open** fires in the restricted areas unless specifically approved by the Fire Marshal of your area, except fires in approved fire pits and improved campgrounds. Also,

please remember that the Utah legislature has changed the law concerning fireworks again this year. Fireworks may only be discharged from July 1st – July 7th and then again from July 21st – July 27th.



Fireworks are only allowed to be launched between the hours of 11am and 11pm. Only fireworks approved for sale in Utah by the State Fire Marshal's office are allowed within the state. No aerial devices are allowed that travel higher than 150 feet. A good rule to follow is that if you cannot purchase it here, you should not launch it here. Open fire and fireworks restrictions will be enforced. Along with the hazards posed by fireworks, please also be mindful of children's fascination with fire.

Within the last year, we had several fires within our community. Many of these fires have been started by children and teens playing with matches or lighters. The costs associated with damages from these fires are high, and the parents are often held liable for the damages caused by their children, as well as the associated costs of fighting these fires. Please keep this in mind as you discuss fire dangers with your family. Education is key, and a little education now can prevent heartache at a later date. We hope that all of you have a safe, enjoyable holiday season.

CROSS CONNECTIONS CAN BE DEADLY!

The North Ogden Water Department is proud of the drinking water it provides. Spring and well water is piped to reservoirs where it is carefully treated with chlorine by trained and certified experts to be sure that it is safe for you to drink. After treatment, the water is then delivered to you through a long series of pipes called a distribution system.

What is a CROSS CONNECTION?

Polluted water doesn't belong in your water system but it can end up there if you are not careful. A cross connection is a link between the drinking water supply and any pipes or fixture that may contain polluted water. You wouldn't want to turn on your faucet and find antifreeze or soapy water coming out, would you? A cross connection can be an open pathway for pollution to get into your drinking water. Backflow is the term used by the North Ogden Water Department to describe how dirty water, chemicals and other contaminants can enter the drinking water supply. Backflow means that the liquid is going the wrong direction in the pipe and that means the dirty water can get into the water line.

What happens if polluted water gets into the drinking water supply through cross connection? Polluted water can spread diseases such as typhoid, polio dysentery and hepatitis. Chemicals can be poisonous. Some types of contaminants can cause damage to the water distribution system, your plumbing fixtures, and water piping.

How can backflow be prevented? The North Ogden Water Department is doing a lot to make sure backflow doesn't happen. Water pressure is kept as high as possible all the time, and customers are notified when the water will be shut off if at all possible, so they won't be caught in the middle of an activity without any water. Backflow can also be prevented by installing special kinds of valves in the water system that will not allow the water to flow backwards. These special valves are called backflow prevention devices.

Can backflow really happen here? Yes. Toxic antifreeze in a solar heating panel leaked into the water system at Platte Canyon High School near Bailey, CO in 1982. Six students were treated for possible illness. A similar incident occurred at the Denver Federal Center in March 1985. Other cases of backflow have had more serious results. Pesticides, propane, sewage, and recycled car wash are among the contaminants that have appeared in the drinking water supplies of other cities.


The North Ogden Water Department has done its part in prevention by installing backflow prevention devices at community facilities, such as parks, schools and city buildings but we can't do it alone, we need your help. Hoses are the most common type of cross connection and they can produce serious results. Here are some things you can do in your home to protect your drinking water.

1. If you don't want to drink it, don't connect your water system to it.
2. Install hose bib vacuum breakers on outside faucets and laundry hookups. These small devices will prevent back-siphon, and they are available at local plumbing supply stores.
3. Create your own air gap. The faucets in your home are built with an air gap to prevent water in your sink or tub from being siphoned into the drinking water system. An air gap is a vertical space (at least two inches) through the air between the end of the faucet or hose and the top of the sink or container. Never submerge a hose, water line or faucet. Always let the water run through an air space before it enters a container.
4. Use extreme care with your garden hose. Do not use your hose to flush your automobile radiator (antifreeze is poisonous) or to clean out sewer traps and clogged drains. Do not use hose-connected sprayers or scrubbers.
5. If you have a solar system, swimming pool, hot tub, darkroom, lawn sprinkling system, evaporative cooler, irrigation well (or use secondary water for irrigation), call the North Ogden Water Department at 782-8111 to arrange for a trained operator to check your system for cross-connections.
6. Good, clean drinking water doesn't just happen, it takes a lot of work. The North Ogden Water Department is doing everything possible to keep the water safe while keeping cost down. Do not let all that work go to waste by allowing contaminants to enter your drinking water system.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT...



GREEN FACTS FOR 2012

May Recycling Benefits for North Ogden



In May we recycled 97 tons of aluminum, cardboard/paper, scrap metals, and plastics.

These recycling efforts conserved the following resources:

- ❖ 1,444 Mature Trees were Saved – Representing enough saved timber resources to produce more than 17,887,500 sheets of newspaper!
- ❖ 352 Cubic Yards of Landfill Airspace – Representing enough airspace to fulfill the municipal waste disposal needs for 452 people for one year!
- ❖ 412,952 Kw-Hrs of Electricity from Recycling – Enough power to fulfill the annual electricity needs of more than 34 homes!
- ❖ 206 Barrels of Oil – Representing enough energy to heat and cool more than 42 homes for one year!
- ❖ Avoided 533 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions – The recycling of these materials prevented these GHG emissions!
- ❖ 602,406 Gallons of Water – Representing enough fresh water to meet the daily fresh water needs of more than 8,032 people!
