As with many tragedies, whether it is a fallen officer, the death of a soldier, a natural disaster, or other calamitous event, there are often groups that seek charitable donations to assist those affected.



Unfortunately, it has come to light after the Ogden incident, that there are people going around seeking donations, claiming falsely to be from legitimate charitable organizations. We ask that you use caution when choosing which groups to donate to. There are unscrupulous people out there who claim, fraudulently, to be seeking donations for

those in need. Before making donations to any organization, for any charitable cause, please independently verify that the person who is seeking your donation legitimately represents the organization they claim to be with. A good place to start is with the Better Business Bureau. It is alright to ask the person at your door or on the phone for an address where you may send your donation. This allows you time to do your homework and verify that the organization is legitimate and that the support you are offering is actually going where it should go. Never feel like you must make your decision immediately. Legitimate organizations will not use high pressure techniques to entice you to make a split second decision. The people in need today will still be appreciative of your donation if you wait until tomorrow to give.



A little research on your part, before you donate to any charity, can also help protect you from identity theft and other types of fraud. Once a criminal gets a hold of your bank account information or credit card number, there is no telling the damage they can do. Charitable organizations appreciate a generous public. Unfortunately, so do scam artists.

7-ELEVEN NORTH OGDEN

Stu and Sue Wallace have been the owners of the 7-Eleven on the corner of 2700 North and Washington Blvd. since purchasing it in August 2011. They also own and operate the 7-Eleven on 32nd St. and Harrison Blvd. Sue started working for 7-Eleven in 1975 as a part-time clerk in Clearfield. She worked 96 hours in the first two weeks. Six months later she was promoted to manager and helped open a new store in Clearfield. She also was a trainer at the Roy store. Stu began running the new store in Clearfield while Sue went on to become a 7-Eleven supervisor responsible for eight stores in Salt Lake. When Stu and Sue's four kids became teenagers they both decided it would be better if Sue was closer to home. Stu went to work for Tech Steel in the Freeport

Center and later was hired as a civilian employee at Hill Air Force Base. Sue went back to managing the store in Clearfield. She also managed the store on Antelope Dr. and in Sunset as well. She was transferred to the 7-Eleven on 32nd and Harrison Blvd. and has been there 18 years. Stu and Sue bought the franchise for that store seven years ago when 7-Eleven began franchising stores. Once Stu retired he began helping at the store every day.

Stu and Sue's 7-Elevens are family operated and they have two great managers. Their daughter, Tracy, runs the store on Harrison Blvd., and Cheri, a family friend, runs the store in North Ogden. Between the two stores they have three granddaughters working in the stores and one grandson who works during the summer. Employees receive an extensive computer-based training program. They are trained to ensure minors are not sold beer or tobacco products and how to spot people who are intoxicated. Employees are required to spend two days on customer service training and are fully trained on how to handle an emergency as well. Stu and Sue really go above and beyond to ensure their stores are successfully run.

Stu and Sue work hard to make sure they have quality products. In fact, they are starting a Fresh Hot Food Program. They will have whole pizzas, pizza slices, chicken tenders, potato wedges, hot wings, dragon wings, hot dogs and sausages, pancake wrapped sausages, and taquitos. They have something for everyone. Dieters can find Slim-fasts, fresh salad and fruit, and chicken tenders that only have 110 calories. For those who want something indulgent they have delicious donuts including ones filled with Bavarian cream or chocolate cream. They carry 10 kinds of coffee and five flavors of cappuccinos all at the same low price. With all the different flavors of coffee, cappuccinos, syrups, and powders there are over 1,300 combinations!

Customer service is very important to Stu and Sue as well as their employees. They want to be the "neighborhood store" and have fun doing it. Stu and Sue think it's important to be part of the community; in fact they usually collect money for people in need and regularly donate money from their own pockets to people in the community.

The left-over bread and donuts go to the Rescue Mission. Stu and Sue understand the importance of shopping local and go to local North Ogden businesses first.


