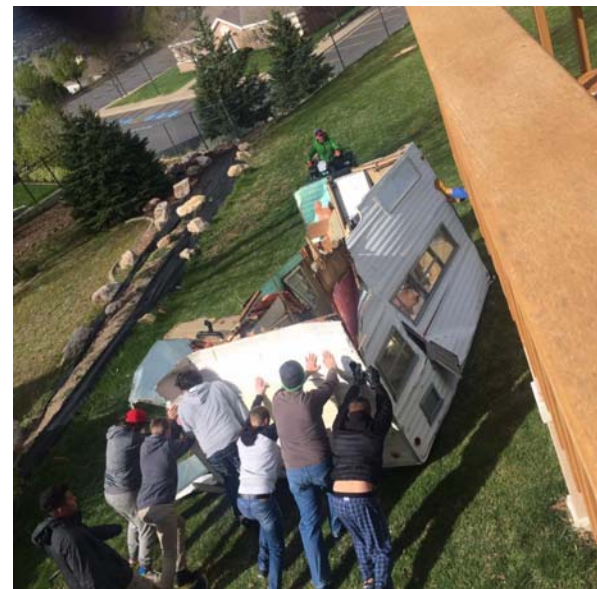
MAYOR'S MESSAE

The Windstorm Shook Homes & Trees, but Not our Community Spirit

On Sunday May 1st a powerful windstorm blew through North Ogden, uprooting hundreds of trees, damaging homes, and sending trampolines, kiddie pools, and other items over fences and down streets. As I toured the city at 6 am, I was amazed by the widespread damage and daunted by the amount of work to be done to clean up the city. The response by North Ogden's citizens and churches to this crisis was incredible, and **I have never been more proud of our city than that Sunday when thousands of North Ogden citizens of all backgrounds turned out to help neighbors saw fallen trees, free trapped vehicles, and clean up damage.**

Local LDS congregations cancelled services and sent church members into neighborhoods to help everyone—regardless of faith. Meanwhile, our Public Works employees rose to the occasion and quickly cleared trees from roadways and opened the Green Waste Pit all day Sunday and for several of the days that followed. Helpful volunteers came to assist our employees at Pit, while many more volunteers roamed the city volunteering to pick up logs, stumps, and branches from people they didn't even know. We had an incredible 3,000 trips into the Pit in a period of only 60 hours!

I was a guest on the Doug Wright Show (KSL News radio) the day after the storm, and our city was recognized statewide by the biggest name in news for the tremendous sense of community and for the outpouring of neighborly caring and concern. When Mother Nature blew through our city and shook homes and trees—the citizens of North Ogden showed that the heart of this city—its citizens—**can overcome any challenge together.** As the Mayor of North Ogden, I want to say **thank you** to each of you who played a role in helping clean up after the windstorm. Many lives were touched and many will never forget the sense of community pride and spirit of that day.



During the summer months, with school out and the warm evenings, we tend to come across more juveniles out late. As a reminder, North Ogden has a curfew for juveniles under 16 years old. "It is unlawful for any person under the age of sixteen (16) years to be or to remain in or upon the streets, alleys, public places or vacant lots in the city on any night, except Friday night, between the hours of ten o'clock (10:00) P.M. and four o'clock (4:00) A.M., or to be upon such streets, alleys, public places or lots on Friday night between the hours of twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight and four o'clock (4:00) A.M., unless such person is accompanied by a parent, guardian or other person having legal custody of such minor person." (North Ogden City Ordinance 6-2D-1)

North Ogden City Parks also close at 10 pm nightly.

We also strongly encourage residents to secure their property and report any suspicious activities to the police right away. It only takes a very short time for someone to steal your property, and leaving vehicles and garages unlocked, and leaving bicycles and other valuables out makes the criminal's job that much easier. Between May, 2015 and April, 2016, in 87% of all vehicle burglaries reported in North Ogden, the vehicle had been left unlocked. Almost 40% of those thefts occurred between the months of June and August. Please help keep our community safe by securing your property and reporting suspicious activity immediately.

WEBER COUNTY ELECTIONS

The 2016 elections will be conducted by mail. The first election this year will be the Primary Election on Tuesday, June 28th.

Primary Elections are a process through which the voters of political parties decide who will represent them on the ballot in November. As such, political parties, not the county, set the rules for which registered voters can participate in their primary elections. Ballots will be mailed out to eligible voters, according to voter's party affiliation, on or before June 7th. Voters must be 18 years old or older, citizens of the United States, and residents of the voting precinct in which they are voting.

Just as a reminder that even though residents are now no longer allowed to burn our yard waste residents are still allowed to have backyard recreational fire pits. As of this point we do not foresee a restriction being placed on recreational fire pits; however, if the weather warms up and dries out as the summer progresses we may have to put a restriction on recreational fire pits as done in years past.

We anticipate that we will be working with North Ogden City Council in placing restrictions on Fireworks again this year. As in previous years there will be a ban on Fireworks east of Mountain Road and north of 3300 north.

HEALTHY LAWN

How much is enough?

Before you can create an efficient watering schedule, you need to determine how much water your lawn is getting from your present method. This test will give you that information; it’s based on measurements taken from different zones in your yard. A zone is a specific area of your landscape served by a series of sprinkler heads. Just follow these simple steps:

1. Set 3 or more flat bottom cans or coffee mugs at various places on your lawn at least 4 feet from the sprinkler heads.
2. Turn on the sprinkler(s) for 15 minutes.
3. Measure the depth of water in each can with a ruler and determine the average water depth in cans by adding up all the measurements and dividing by the number of cans used.
4. Match your sprinkler output with the table below. Then water as indicated.

Water Conservation Tips

Water conservation measures are an important first step in protecting our water supply. Such measures not only save the supply of our source water, but can also save you money by reducing your water bill. Here are a few suggestions.

Conservation measures you can use inside your home include:

- Fix leaking faucets, pipes, toilets, etc.
- Replace old fixtures; install water-saving devices in faucets, toilets, and appliances. ·Wash only full loads of laundry.
- Do not use the toilet for trash disposal.
- Take shorter showers.
- Do not let the water run while shaving or brushing teeth.
- Soak dishes before washing.
- Run the dishwasher only when full.

You can conserve outdoors as well:

- Water the lawn and garden in the early morning or evening.
- Use mulch around plants and shrubs.
- Repair leaks in faucets and hoses.
- Use water-saving nozzles.
- Use water from a bucket to wash your car, and save the hose for rinsing.
